## MILL SCHOOL

#### FEBRUARY MEETING

### OUR "HERITAGE" HOME

The FISK CARLIN HOUSE, home of the Palmyra Historical Society, stands on Lot 4 and part of Lot 3 in Block 4 of the Original Powers Plat as surveyed by John Fish in 1843, 1847 & 1850. Originally Lots 5 & 6 were also a part of the land parcel.

Judging by the value of the property as indicated on the abstract of title, the house was probably built by Monroe McKenzie in the late 1840's. It is of grout or poured concrete structure, which was popular in limited areas in the 1840's. Other similar grout houses are found in Milton, Wisconsin. There is one additional grout house in Palmyra, the Stanley Gerlach home at 312 Main Street.

It is our hope that the FISK CARLIN HOUSE will be added to the NATIONAL REGISTER during this coming year.

#### WE ARE COVERED

The ELECTROLARM SYSTEM has been installed in the FISK CARLIN HOUSE. There were some problems with the installation, but the company has rectified the inadequacies and did a good job in concealing the wires, while keeping damage to walls and doors to a minimum. The total cost of the system was \$1105.50 plus a yearly monitoring cost of \$144.00. We feel that our possessions and property are well protected.
